ANNUAL REPORT.

Reading his lucid annual report, the

head teacher paid compliment to Dr. and Mrs. Cunningham for their presence. He had known the former for several years, and his educational research work had been ever valuable. Three hundred pupils were in attendance this year, or 86 in excess of 1933; and, due to the introduction of a new course for girls, he claimed was no lessened desire nf parents to give their children advantages of a higher education. Of the recent exhibition of pupils' work he spoke encouragingly, and of the teachers 2lso.

Last year candidates for the University examination had maintained a good standard set by previous years. In technical examination results had been excellent, and that was so as regards proficiency in arts and homecrafts.

For the I.O.R. examination 53 candidates sat. Fanny Amor and Margaret Brumley obtained 93 and 91 per cent. respectively, and they divide the prize. John Lang has been accepted for the Hemingway and Robertson coaching college. Ex-students who had been doing excellent work were also mentioned.

SPORT.

The school had done well in sportsmanship in every department. many, in contest with other clubs, they had shown to advantage, and had frequently been successful. Hockey, basketball, cricket. football, tennis and foot-racing had been the attractions.
